Important Information

In cooperation with the Governor's directive to close nonessential services for the two week period from March 28 -April 11, our pastors and staff will stay at home during this time and our office will be closed. Our council is planning a virtual meeting on April 8 to determine where we are at that time. If the Governor's suspension is not extended, we plan to resume regular office hours on Monday, April 13.

We do not take these steps lightly. We understand they are taken in the best interest of our neighbors. For now, we remain Connected in Faith even though we are separated by social distance. We will continue to post updates, prayers, videos etc. on our Facebook Page, and are still available by e-mail or phone.

From Pastor Mark

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Grace and peace be unto you from God our Father and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

The Lord Be With You ...

We are living through challenging times. There is a lot of concern and anxiety as we are all taking unprecedented steps to try to slow down the spread of the coronavirus, compounded by the practical concerns of people being out of work and still needing to keep up with their responsibilities. Those on the margins who were already struggling are finding it even harder to provide for basic necessities. With the familiar routine of everyday life upended and with the isolation we are feeling in needing to be apart from each other, there is also the uncertainty about how long all of this will last.

Two things we can know for certain. One is that, as the old saying goes, "this, too, shall pass." It may be a bumpy ride for now, but we will come out of the other side of this. And, I suspect, perhaps with a new perspective on things we can normally take for granted, with a new appreciation for the gifts of faith and food and fellowship, with a renewed understanding that, through our forced isolation, we come to a deeper realization of how precious our connections are with each other.

We can also know with certainty that the Lord is with us. One of my favorite passages of Scripture is the end of the eighth chapter of Romans where the apostle Paul poses the question, "What then can separate us from the love of Christ?" And then Paul goes on to name some big separators: "Can tribulation or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or peril or the sword?" "No," Paul responds, "In all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us." And then, in the last two verses, I love the way that Paul takes off and soars on the wings of poetry: "For I am convinced that neither death nor life, nor angels nor principalities, nor things that are present nor things that are yet to come, nor power, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all of creation will be able to separate us from the love that God has for us through Jesus Christ, our Lord."

When Paul writes about facing tribulation, persecution, famine, peril and the sword, he wasn't just making it up. He and the early Christian community faced some very hard and uncertain times. And yet, through it all, Paul sounds a note of confident triumph. Nothing, in all of creation, no uncertain time, no hardship, not even death itself can separate us from the love of God in Christ. And it is that love that holds us all, individually and as a family of faith, through the hard and uncertain places in life. So let's keep walking on in hope, looking up in faith, and reaching out in love.

Here at the Church our staff is working on...

Even though we are physically apart we are working on ways to stay connected and to be the church together through this time. These ideas will be evolving over time so watch for more details as they develop.

Worship is one way we can stay connected. Pastor Sarah has posted sermons for March 15 and 22 on our Facebook and Website. Click on and watch. Our March 29 worship service recording will expand to include all of the normal elements of our worship (minus the music) with such things as our Confession, Prayer of the Day, Readings, Sermon, Creed, Offering and Offertory Prayer (for this part, check out the ways we can continue to give without passing the offering plate), Holy Communion (you'll be asked to get a piece of bread and either wine or juice from your home to participate in this), Lord's Prayer, Community Prayers and Benediction. I'm guessing we will also have special music from time to time.

Our Sunday service will post each week on Sunday morning (9:00 a.m. on our Website and Facebook Page. Our local cable channel will show our March 29 service on Sunday at 9:00 a.m. We'd like to have our Sunday service back on local cable following the Governor's 2 week shutdown).

Also, please watch for our Holy Week services: Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter. We will be recording them for viewing on our Website.

Connect and Confirmation students are encouraged to tune in and watch the service together with their families, if possible. After Lent, we will also be looking at ways to share lessons online. Our Children's Ministry Team will be posting on Saturdays ways to stay connected with ideas and resources to nurture our faith at home.

We are urging our members to stay connected in practical ways through this time, as well. Send a card. Make a phone call. Little personal touches make a big difference! Share on Facebook where you have seen God today, how you are living your faith through this time, how you are reaching out to others, etc. It will be good to continue to have an online meeting place to keep in touch and to hear each other's stories and reflections.

Ways we are continuing to be in Communication...

Our April Newsletter will not be going out through the mail but will be available to see on our Website. Also, please get used to looking at our Website and Facebook page for timely updates, information, devotions, prayers and other items. We will be updating our communication with you on a daily basis, so stay tuned. As I said, this is an evolving process and watch for further developments.

Let us remember those with special need for prayer, those who are working in the front lines of the pandemic, our leaders that they make wise and prudent decisions, those who are suffering from illness, lay-offs, or uncertainty. And, very importantly, let us not forget to give thanks. It can become too easy to let our hearts and minds get weighed down by all of the negative things. But, amidst it all, there is always something for which to be thankful. A thankful heart, a heart that does not forget it's blessings, is a strong heart.

Speaking of this, another of my favorite passages is Philippians 4:4-7, where the apostle Paul writes: "Rejoice in the Lord always! Again I will say, Rejoice! The Lord is near. Be anxious in nothing but in everything, by praver and petition - together with thanksgiving - let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God that passes all understanding will keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." Did you know that Paul was in prison when he wrote this? Talk about living through a hard time of uncertainty. And yet, convinced that the Lord was with him even in that dark time, he was able to write such a passage of inspiration and hope. And, you'll notice, he didn't forget the part about "together with thanksgiving."

Stay Informed ...

As we've seen, events can change rapidly. In accordance with the Governor's 2 week closure from March 28 - April 11, our office will be closed and our staff will be working from home. All activities are suspended through this time, as well.

If the Governor's two week closure is not extended, we expect to have our office open again with regular weekday hours on Monday, April 13. Our council will be meeting virtually on April 8 to make a decision about whether or not to continue suspension of our activities. We will keep you informed and updated on our Website and Facebook page. So Stay Tuned...

At some point the "all clear" will sound and we will all be able to get back together! Even though we can watch T.V. and look at things on our computer, there is really no substitute for getting together for worship, fellowship, learning and service. CHANGE IN THE CHURCH

Not every situation is directly covered in the Bible. I used to joke with the Confirmation students that they couldn't find a Bible verse on smartphones or the internet. I kind of regret that now.

This is an unprecedented situation. While we've faced crisis before as a society, we really haven't had a situation of social distancing on a global scale--and this time we have the technology to remain connected and open while staying apart.

While there may not be a Bible verse that specifically mentions video conferences or live-streaming, there are stories--many stories--of people dealing with isolation, change, and the restoration of community. The consistent overall message is clear: God is love, and people belong--in society and in community--and should be cared for as part of that community.

In the last week, what community means has drastically shifted. Caring for people now means keeping a physical distance. Rev. Jacqui Lewis, PhD, said it very well on March 13:

It's scary to watch everything getting canceled--to see the streets of Broadway go dark. But, these are really signs of hope: People making tough and painful decisions to reduce viral transmission. Right now, love looks like an empty stadium.¹

That last sentence has been quoted again and again, and even paraphrased by some congregational leaders to say "Love looks like an empty church."²

Caring for people right now means social distancing, but it does not mean total disconnection. It means change. It means innovation and imagination about how we can stay connected and in community from a distance. It means breaking from the way we've always done things to adapt to a situation we haven't encountered before.

One thing that the church can do--and has done--is change. Maybe not with carpet color or Christmas ornaments, but change has happened. Books have been written about it. I've written articles about it. From a few apostles to a world-wide faith, from Nicea to the Reformation, the church has made drastic shifts. Here at St. John, I've been told several times about the history of the building, the additions, the new curriculums tried, the different worship bands and choirs, and so on.

We have a rich history that has prepared us for change, and we have a foundation in the Bible that talks about how we are to live life and care for each other— especially when that means change. There are many passages that talk about this, but I'll leave you with this one from Luke:

¹²The day was drawing to a close, and the twelve came to him and said, "Send the crowd away, so that they may go into the surrounding villages and countryside, to lodge and get provisions; for we are here in a deserted place." ¹³ But he said to them, "You give them something to eat." They said, "We have no more than five loaves and two fish-- unless we are to go and buy food for all these people." ¹⁴ For there were about five thousand men. And he said to his disciples, "Make them sit down in groups of about fifty each." ¹⁵ They did so and made them all sit down. ¹⁶ And taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke them, and gave them to the disciples to set before the crowd. ¹⁷ And all ate and were filled. What was left over was gathered up, twelve baskets of broken pieces.³

We can imagine something other than the way things have always been done, and we have the tools to make that change— telephones, smartphones, the internet, the mail, etc. Scientists, governments, and healthcare providers are working to get us to a place where the social distancing can end. In the meantime, we are called to care for one another and find new ways to be the church in community.

Opening Devotions: Pastor Mark shared devotions

<u>Approval of Minutes</u>: Members of Council reviewed the minutes from the February 22, 2020 council meeting. Motion was made, seconded and carried to approve the meeting minutes.

Pastor Mark's Report:

With the Covid-19 concerns about staying safe and supporting the health and well being of our neighbors, we have suspended activity at the church until April 5, with the council revisiting things on April 1 to decide what direction to take from there. Along with a brief posting on our Website a more informational letter has been mailed to all members.

Staff attended a Synod Video Conference on the Coronavirus and we are working on ways to be the church during this unusual time. We are brainstorming and game planning around worship, youth and family, ways of staying connected (albeit separately), stewardship, etc. We are in the developmental stage of this and will be trying some different things. We will be posting regular communications to our members online and, quite probably, through other mailings, as needed.

Strategic Planning: Per our past council discussions, phone calls have been made and interviews have been set up with consultants to come and meet with our church council and present on the value, process and price of a strategic planning process. The March meeting will feature a consultant from the Joshua Group and the April meeting we will get together with a consultant from the James Company.

Families Moving Forward is currently undergoing a process of restructuring our leadership on our local level. To date, this is fluid at this time and we will keep everyone posted as we reach more clarity.

The Personnel Committee has refined our background check process to ask that all volunteers in need of a check have their application done two weeks prior to contact with children.

Baptisms are either being rescheduled to a later date or done in a small, immediate family setting. Funerals are having immediate family cemetery committal services to be followed by a public gathering later when we are able to gather together.

Ongoing activities include working with staff on ways to continue to reach out and be the church at such an unusual time. Sermons and worship will continue online and, possibly, through our local cable channel. Communications to the congregation will also need to be continued on a regular basis.

Pastor Sarah's Report

Online Ministry— Due to the concerns about COVID-19, gatherings and activities at St. John have been cancelled until at least April 5. In an effort to offer a connection to faith and community during this time, an online outreach has begun. The sermon originally prepared for March 15 was recorded and posted on St. John's Facebook page. Prayers, reflections, and other opportunities to engage from home are also being developed and posted.

Youth Ministry— The Mission Trip Fundraiser Dinner and Silent Auction was a success! Thank you to everyone who participated, donated items, and attended the event. Other fundraisers for this summer's trip to Vermont will resume when church activities do.

Connect and Confirmation— Lenten Dinners began on Ash Wednesday, February 26, and ran through Wednesday, March 11. Upon cancellation of worship services, every Connect and Confirmation student received three more Wor-

ship Note credits since there would be no way of knowing which students would have attended if worship had not been cancelled. Registrations for Confirmation Camp have been sent to Camp Onomia. Guidelines for an alternative project are being submitted for review and approval by Council for those students who are not able to attend.

Ongoing Items— Development of online resources such as video recordings and social media posts; writing sermons, posts, and newsletter articles; remaining up-to-date with developments in the news regarding the pandemic; council and staff meetings as needed.

Treasurer: Rae presented the January financial reports for the General and Building fund and answered questions from the council. She also reviewed the summary of the Earl Stier bequest report.

Rae asked the council to read and review the foundation documents before the next meeting.

Motion was made, seconded and carried to adjourn at 7:45pm. Meeting was adjourned followed by the Lord's prayer.




