From Pastor Mark

For some reason, my brother had three barrels of books that he hauled around from place to place as he moved. Big barrels. Full of books. He never really read them but he couldn't seem to get rid of them either. I don't know how many backs he broke helping him move those things. Then, in the Spring of 1997, he and his family were living in East Grand Forks and getting ready to move to Parshall, North Dakota. In the interim, the Red River flooded and four feet of water entered their apartment. Among some things they lost were those three barrels of books. That was actually a blessing. The flood delivered him from having to drag those things around with him everywhere he went.

The older I get, the more I think of life as a journey with different stages. When we're young, we are in the process of discovering who we are, what interests and passions we have, what we want to do for work, who we might marry, how we will make a home, what it means to be a parent, what goals we might aspire toward, etc. In this developing stage of life we are naturally acquisitive and adding things to our life, taking on new responsibilities, acquiring and managing the means to make our way. This is a good and natural part of life's process.

Along the way, we probably pick up and carry with us more than we need. At some point, it makes sense to look at what we can let go. Some of these things are on the outside, like those barrels of books. Some of these things are on the inside, habits and attitudes and priorities. What made sense holding and keeping at one stage of life may not make sense later on. There is a certain wisdom in acknowledging what we really need, what is enough, and letting go of the things that needlessly weigh us down. This makes sense. We need to exhale so we can inhale. We need to empty a cup of something bitter to fill it with something sweet. We need to lay some things down to make room for other things more needful.

This is a personal process. What are those things that, as you look at your life, make sense to lay down and leave behind so that you can move forward lighter and more freely? Are there old bitternesses you are hanging onto? Is there some anxiety that continues to gnaw away? Is there an unhealthy relationship that weighs upon you? What stuff is in the back of your closet, both physically and mentally and spiritually, that takes up needless space? Ask yourself, "Do I really need to keep this? Or should I let this go?"

One hard won lesson I have wrestled with learning is where the fence line is between what I can do and what I can't, particularly as it comes to other people's lives. I have wanted other people to do things or make changes and learned that, unless they want to do it for themselves, no amount of my concern and anxiety makes any difference. In fact, it can be counter productive. One of my seminary professors said, "There is only one Messiah. And you're not it."

This is why I keep coming back to the wisdom of the Serenity Prayer. There is so much wisdom packed into such few words: "God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change," - (a whole lot of things fall into this category) - "Courage to change the things I can" - (basically involving myself) - "And the wisdom to know the difference." This is the tricky part. Where is the fence line? What is and should be on my plate, and what shouldn't? What should I own and what should I let go of? What needs to be given over to God? (And probably repeatedly, because I will tend to turn right around and pick it up again).

Linus, from the cartoon "Peanuts," had to carry around his security blanket with him wherever he went. In some sense, the stuff we carry around can serve the same purpose, providing some function of security even if it no longer makes any sense (think three barrels of books). As we dig through our closets or root around out in the garage we think, "But I might need this." Really? Will you really need this? And if not, why are you hanging on to it? At a certain place on our journey, it makes sense to lean toward the process of letting go, pairing down, lightening the load. If we don't do it, someone else will do it for us. We won't be taking any of it with us. As Job says in the Bible, "Naked I came into this world, and naked I will leave it." I'm speaking here of physical things. We should also include our mental and spiritual closets. What things are we holding onto that no longer give us life? What can we give over to the Lord and leave behind? How can we be freed up to become more open to the Lord's will in our lives?

The letting go we practice can prepare us for the final letting go. It can be a scary thought, feeling like the trapeze artist getting rid of the security net. But when we let go, when we fall, what do we fall into? We fall into the good and loving hands of God. God is there. God will catch us. God is not going to miss us or drop us. God will hold on to us and bring us to our final home.

In the end, the only thing we can really possess at all is our relationship with this life giving God. And that's a good thing. God will not leave us or forsake us. That's the gospel truth. You can cash that check and count on it.

Pastor Mark's Report

Our Midweek Lenten Scheduled commenced on Ash Wednesday, March 2, with a Soup and Sandwich Supper in the Gathering Area at 5:30 p.m. followed by a Worship Service in the Sanctuary at 6:30 p.m. Due to the pandemic situation we have been living through I was unsure what to expect on Ash Wednesday and was pleasantly surprised to see a full house. It was really wonderful to be back together for a time of food and fellowship and worship and I know that many members of the congregation really cherish these Wednesday evenings together, as well. Many thanks to our Confirmation students, families and leaders for hosting our meal time.

And also, much thanks to our musicians and cantors for our Holden Evening Prayer Service and to our speakers who will be sharing with us on our theme, "What Does Being A Christian Mean To Me?" I'm looking forward to the rest of our Wednesdays that will be leading us into Holy Week.

Registration is being finalized at Camp Onomia for our seventh graders to attend Confirmation Camp this Summer on the week of June 12-17. Camp is a unique "plunge" experience of going for a week of learning and sharing and fun activities together in God's great outdoors. Because Camp is such a unique experience, it has always been a required part of our Confirmation program following the seventh grade year and, as such, St. John will once again provide a substantial subsidy for our campers to have this unique experience. Follow up with this group will happen as we get closer to June.

I met with our Children's Team regarding Vacation Bible School and, after discussion among themselves, they have decided to have Day Camp, hosted by counselors from Camp Onomia, on the week of June 20-23 (counselors arrive in town the day before). Registration is already taking place through the team online. They have also decided to promote the new opportunity of Vacation Bible School on the Farm that takes place later this Summer from August 1-5. This venture involves a collaboration between our Synod's local Spanish ministry, Cristo Obrero, at the host site of the Prairie Oaks Institute here in Belle Plaine. This will be a cross cultural learning and sharing experience.

It appears that we might finally be coming out of the pandemic we have been living through these past two years that has caused such disruptions in every way within our church and society. It has been challenging and I am grateful for the support of the congregation through this time. The live streaming and recording of our worship services has been necessary through this time. I believe we will continue to offer this. However, as we hopefully move into a new time now I think it is important to recognize that worship, in it's best sense, is not meant to be a commodity to be consumed by ourselves online but rather is meant to be experienced as part of a living community gathered together in the Lord's presence. I hope that we grow toward that goal of being together again and that our online worship will be used as an occasional backup option.

Regular weekly and monthly rhythms of parish life continue apace including times for preparation and facilitation for preaching, baptisms, weddings and funerals, visitation at homes and hospitals, staff and volunteer meetings, correspondences and coordination, etc. We are blessed with a busy and active parish.

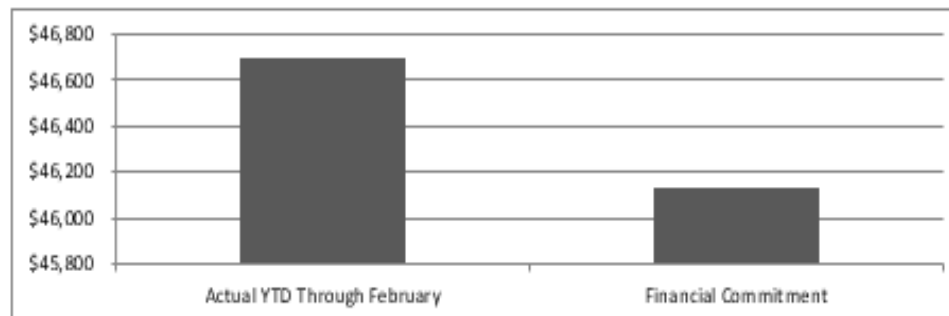
