From Pastor Mark

I remember walking out on the new deck that was built onto the parsonage in Rothsay a number of years ago and thinking, "Wow! This morning there was nothing here. And now I'm walking on this freshly built deck and admiring how solid and well put together it is." And I remember thinking how satisfying it must be for the guys who built it. At the end of the day, they could look back at that deck and say, "Here's what I did today!" And there it was, solid and tangible, something you could walk on and sit on, a visible and concrete monument to their efforts that would last for a long time.

It's a different kind of situation when we are interacting with people's lives and planting seeds into human hearts. Most of the time, the results of such efforts aren't so immediate and apparent and tangible and concrete. There generally isn't a time when we say, "Here is the solid evidence of what I did today," because the activity of such efforts are often silently processing and germinating in quiet ways within the depths of the human soul. Teachers and preachers and counselors know this, but so do friends who listen, volunteers who take time to work with kids, family members who visit the elderly, college-age counselors at Bible Camp and Vacation Bible School, colleagues who take a moment to talk with another about a recent loss, and the other countless and everyday opportunities to reach out and touch the life of another human being. Each day we sow seeds into other's lives.

And what happens once a seed is sown into another's heart? Then it is out of our hands. The words have been spoken, the action has been taken, the gesture has been offered. Sometimes the word that we speak or the action that we take has a significant impact, maybe not immediately but as a catalyst within a larger constellation of circumstances within another person's life. And, at other times, the word or effort we make may have no impact at all. Even so, the gesture is not without its own intrinsic merit. It often times has an impact on us. And, it is simply the right thing to do.

There are versions of a parable of Jesus in Matthew 13, Mark 4 and Luke 8 of "a sower who went out to sow..." The seed was flung generously far and wide. Some seeds landed on hard ground and did not penetrate into the soil. Other seeds landed among the weeds and were choked out. And some landed on soil that was ready and receptive and, over time, produced varying amounts of grain.

In his book, "Seeds of Contemplation," Thomas Merton begins by stating that we are always sowing and receiving seeds. We cannot help it. It is the inevitable process of being in living contact with each other. Some seeds last and some don't. And there is a mystery about this that is greater than we are. Even Jesus, when he had concluded many of his teachings, would say, "Anyone who has ears to hear, let him hear," a tacit acknowledgement that the seeds of his words would fall on some receptive hearts and also onto some non-receptive hearts.

I suppose we might say that we are spiritual farmers in the church, working to plant good and encouraging and Christ-like seeds into the soil of human hearts. We are responsible for the effort and God is responsible for the outcome. The efforts that we make in the name of Christ are released into the winds of the Holy Spirit and reach out beyond us.

I received a nice card of thanks this week. It was nice to know that something I had done for someone was received and appreciated. And it is a nice thing to let others know and to thank them when what they have done has encouraged us, or brought us an insight, or simply supported us in a time when we needed it. I suspect there are times in your life when someone spoke a word of encouragement or insight or direction to you that, when you look back on it, made a real difference in your life. And, perhaps at the time, that person didn't even know it. And they may still not know it. Take some time to thank those who have helped you, who have sown an encouraging seed into your heart that has made a positive impact in your life. Take some time to let them know that they are appreciated. And, in doing so, you will be sowing seeds of life that will continue to grow unto an abundant harvest.

HOW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW?

It's not magic, and it doesn't happen on its own.

A good harvest— whether from a garden or field— takes intentionality and work. Before you even select the type of crop you want to plant, the soil itself needs work. You have to clear out any chaff from previous crops and cultivate the field or garden plot. After selecting the seeds, care also needs to be taken in how they are sown. Attention must be given to how deep and how far apart the seeds need to be planted in order to grow properly.

I think there's a reason that our faith lives are often compared to a harvest. There is a lot of work that has to be done just to plant the seeds for that hoped-for yield, and the work doesn't end there.

Very few gardeners and farmers— if any— would say that once the seeds are planted, there's nothing left to do.

Fields need water and sunlight. Crops may need to be irrigated if there isn't enough rain. Weeds and pests need to be checked for and prevented if possible. The ground may need to be fertilized so that there are enough nutrients for the crop to grow well. Some plants may need to be thinned or pruned so that their energy goes into producing the desired fruit for the harvest.

Of course, there are exceptions to the rule. There are plants that will thrive in harsh conditions or in the wild on their own, and even the best-tended garden can fail to produce. These things happen, but they are the exceptions, not the rule.

To give a harvest the best chance it has, a field or garden needs regular engagement. It requires attention and tending to be successful in its growth and yield.

Our faith kind of works the same way. It needs regular engagement, too— tending and nurturing to give it its best chance at growing and thriving. In our baptism, we make promises to engage and to help each other so that we can grow into a mature faith that reflects God's love and works for God's will in our lives and the world around us.

While there can be exceptions, most of us will be part of the rule. We will need to spend time engaged with our faith— studying the Bible, attending worship services, talking with and being around the other members of our congregation and faith community, praying, and acting in ways that reflect God's justice and peace to the world around us. This is how we tend to our faith, giving ourselves the best chance to grow into the mature Christians we hope to be.

As we think about the fields and gardens around us this fall, we are left with a question: How are we growing this season?

Connect Orientation Night/Rally Night: Wednesday, September 11th @ 6:00pm. This night is for parents and students of 5th and 6th graders. We will be going over the schedule for the year, sharing about the Connect curriculum, meeting your student's teachers, and answering any questions. The first Connect class will be Wednesday, Sept. 18th at 6pm.

Sunday, September 15th will kick off our programming year. There is a lot going on!

- Backpack Blessing: All school aged children from Pre-K to High School are encouraged to bring their backpacks to the 8:00 or 10:30 church service to receive a blessing for the school year.
 Bible Sunday: Children (3 year olds, 1st grade, and 5th grade) will receive Bibles during the 8:00 or 10:30 service.
- Rally Sunday will be an orientation for PreK-4th grade students and parents in the church basement. Please plan to stay with your child on this morning. You will meet their teacher then seperate for a short overview of the school year. Our first Sunday School class will be Sunday, September 22nd from 9:15-10:15am.
- **First Communion Instruction:** This evening class (time to be announced) is for 5th grade students and older who have not yet received the sacrament of communion. First Communion Sunday will be September 22nd at both services.

-Each Sunday school classroom needs a minimum of two teachers. Teachers can rotate weeks and work with each other's schedule to allow flexibility and convenience in this commitment

-One parent helper and one student helper in each room (or more depending on class size), each week. Commit to every other week, one Sunday a month, or every week if you can!


