From Pastor Mark

This year, in Confirmation, we are going through the Bible. A few weeks ago, the lesson was about the prophets. Over the course of seven centuries, from the 8th through the 2nd centuries B.C., the prophets were individuals who rose up to speak a word of the Lord to the people of Israel. There were non-writing prophets (meaning there is no book in the Bible from them). 2 of the greatest prophets, Elijah and his successor, Elisha, were non-writing prophets. You can read their stories at the end and beginning of I and II Kings. There were also writing prophets (with a book named after them in the Bible). 5 of these are so-called major prophets (mainly because their books are longer) and 12 of them are minor

prophets. You'll find the major prophets in your Bible from Isaiah through Daniel and the minor prophets from Hosea through Malachi.

Most people think of a prophet as someone who predicts the future. However, the role of the prophets in Old Testament Israel was really more about shining a spotlight on the ways that the people had forsaken God's way and the consequences of that. Two significant things were called out by the prophets. First, the people had violated their relationship with God, forsaking God and worshiping idols. Since the First Commandment says, "I am the Lord your God, you shall have no other gods before me," this was a serious matter. The second thing the prophets pointed out was how the people had violated their relationship with each other (and through that, with God). The rich were getting richer and the poor were getting poorer. Injustice and corruption were rampant. The commandment to "love your neighbor as yourself" was largely forgotten. The nation was rotting from the inside out.

The prophets warned that the people would be called to account. Judgment was coming. But the prophets also offered hope. Even though the people would suffer, God would not forget about them. Although their sins would have consequences, God would not abandon them.

Now, of course, the issues the prophets were so concerned about were not just relevant back in Bible times. They are still relevant today. Technology has changed but the human heart remains the same. And so the role and the words of the biblical prophets continue to resonate today.

That said, the role of a prophet is not just confined to Bible times, either. If we say that a prophet is someone who sees the context within which they live and who speaks a needed word to people in their own time and place then, in this sense, we could say that Martin Luther was a prophet, speaking a needed word to the people of his time and calling them back to the gospel message of God's grace in Christ. In our own time, Martin Luther King, Jr. rose up with a needed voice, calling people to repent of their prejudices and offering the hope of a more just and equal society.

With this in mind, I invited our Confirmation students to think of themselves as a prophet. What are some of the issues within our society that call for a voice to be lifted up? If they were to speak a needed word to the people of our own time and place, what would they be concerned about? Each of our students wrote a topic on a sticky note and we collected them all and placed them on a bulletin board in the front of the class. I was impressed by their list. Some of their concerns included:

The Need to gain power over people through money, politics, race, social position and status Environmental Health for plants and animals Poverty

How about that for a list! These young Confirmands are listening and aware and they are concerned about the world that we live in. The need for prophets to speak and for people to respond continues to be vital. What are the consequences of our current behaviors? How can we seek and work for positive change? How does our faith connect in practical ways to the way we live? The story of the prophets continues in our day and time. How are we listening? And what are we doing?

From Pastor Sarah

I LOVE TO TELL THE STORY

Do we? Last week I was reminded that while we may want to tell the story of our faith, we may not actually know it that well. Each week in church we read pieces of it from a few different books, but we don't always connect them to the larger narrative or talk about their context.

What happened to make Amos say, "I hate, I despise your festivals"?¹ Who are the Corinthians? Why did we need prophets? How is Joseph connected to Moses? What is the significance of the Promised Land or the New Covenant? Who is Deborah? What is Edom?

We have a wealth of stories to share— a whole library of books in the Bible filled with lessons and examples of faith that we could learn from and apply in so many situations. The Lectionary— the pre-set selection of readings we use each week in church— helps us read more than just the same few high points or a pastor's favorite passages.

However, we still don't get to all of it, and we often miss out on some important context and nuance. We might not discover some of the faithful examples we could look to for guidance and support in our everyday lives.

I'm not sure if it's possible to address this in the 10-20 minutes we have for Scripture and Reflection during Worship. Maybe it is. I'll think about that, but let's also think about this.

Maybe there's a way for each of us to do more, too. Seek out that information. Go after it. Join the Bible Studies and Wednesday Youth Classes— that's actually where these questions came from in the first place. Once you start going a little deeper and learning even just a little more, that's when you realize there's a richer and more complex understanding of faith to carry with you into the complex world. That's when our faith and our relationship with God deepens because we learn more and more about it.

That's when this story becomes one we love to tell.

If you are already diving deeper into Scripture, then you've maybe already seen how you can learn something new each time. You've maybe seen how lines in hymns and liturgies can take on new meaning. Go back again— a fresh reading or new life situation can change what you hear and understand, too.

If you are just starting, I encourage you in those first steps. Take a few minutes each day to read through a book in the Bible— start with a Gospel. I hope you continue to dive more deeply into our faith narrative and see how you are part of it, too. Know that your church and your pastors are here to help and support you. Don't hesitate to share questions— or exciting new insights.

I love to tell the story, for those who know it best seem hungering and thirsting to hear it like the rest. And when, in scenes of glory, I sing the new, new song, I'll sing the old, old story that I have loved so long.²



Unapproved St. John Lutheran Church Council Minutes January 16, 2020

President Chris Stier called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

Present: Pastor Mark Johnson, Pastor Sarah Timian, Council Members; Brian Schmidt, Chris Zellman, Jim Eggers, Angie Kahle, Bob Fairbanks, Sandy Schultz, Amy Franck. Staff: Curt Johnson and Rae Fimon.

Opening Devotions: Pastor Sarah led the devotions. She gave us a review of all the resources that are available right within our hymnal. There are weekly and daily lectionaries in the back of the hymnal, as well as prayers for special occasions in the front of the hymnal. Pastor Sarah read from Galatians Chapter 1, vs. 6-12, Paul's letter to the Galatians telling them to follow the gospel, followed by a prayer for those seeking a deeper knowledge of God.

Approval of Minutes: Members of Council reviewed the minutes from the December 19, 2019 Council Meeting. Motion was made, seconded and carried to approve the meeting minutes.

Pastor Mark's Report:

We enjoyed good weather and had a good turnout for our **Sunday School Christmas Program** on December 22 and our Christmas Eve and Day Services on December 24 and 25. With the advent of the new year, we are looking ahead, coordinating staff and calendars, and planning upcoming events. Soon, it will be Lent!

As usual for this time of year, it has been a busy time preparing for the **annual meeting**, with all the various reports, the agenda and all of the information that goes into it. The Nominating Committee has completed a full slate of candidates for the Church Council, the Foundation Committee, the Personnel Committee, the Assistant Head Usher position, as well as Camp Onomia delegates.

Connect and Confirmation Small Group Leaders had an opportunity to meet without the kids present to discuss how the current year, what is going well and what can be improved. For the most part, the year is going very well. There were also a couple of things mentioned that will be followed up on.

Regular and Ongoing pastoral ministry, including preparation and participation Sunday Services, baptisms, weddings, funerals, visitation in homes and hospitals, administrative duties with staff and committee meetings, Southwest Conference meeting, communications and correspondence, etc.

Pastor Sarah's Report

Youth Ministry— Students are continuing to plan for next summer's Mission Trip to Vermont. The Mission Trip Dinner Fundraiser has been postponed from Saturday, January 25 to Sunday, February 23, due to scheduling issues. Connect and Confirmation— Connect and Confirmation Leaders met on January 8 to discuss the year so far and plans for the second semester, and regular classes resumed on January 15. Students and adult leaders will be volunteering at Feed My Starving Children in Chanhassen again on January 22. Postcards have been sent to all Connect and Confirmation students with January reminders as well as updates on each student's worship note progress. Another mailing will be sent to Confirmation Students at the end of January/beginning of February with information on the Lenten Dinners and Worship Services as well as Confirmation Camp.

Ongoing Items— Worship Leadership for Saturday and Sunday Services; Meetings with Connect and Confirmation Leaders and Students; Pastoral Conversations and Visits; Ministry Team Meetings as needed and available; Planning and Preparation for events, meetings, newsletter articles, classes, communication pieces, mailings, worship services, etc.

Staff Report:

Custodial: nothing new to report

Treasurer: The <u>General Fund</u> did not have a great December. Revenue is about \$42,000.00 short of projected commitment. Revenue is up 5% over 2018. Expenses, however, were \$10,000.00 lower than expected so our net shortfall is approximately \$32,000.00 in the General Fund. The General Fund was not able to repay any loans to the Building Fund or Foundation in 2019.

The <u>Building Fund</u> has a balance of about \$50,000.00 after loans to the General Fund. In 2018 an additional principal payment was made on the mortgage. We were not able to do that in 2019.

Transfers In - none Transfers Out – none

Ongoing Business

Ashton Pankonin of KMF Advisors reviewed the <u>Foundation</u> investments with the Council and answered council questions about the investments. There are 2 investments; Jackson Annuity and a Mutual Fund. The Jackson Annuity \$75,000.00 investment with a death penalty allows for an annual 5% withdrawal. This withdrawal does not affect the initial \$75,000.00 investment. The \$75,000.00 Mutual Fund is in a moderate 60/40 mix of stocks and fixed income. Ashton says this is a common mix for non-profit organizations. The Mutual Fund had an increase of 7% for the year. After the presentation by Ashton, and discussion by the council, motion was made, seconded and all in favor to proceed with the guaranteed 5% annual draw from the Jackson Annuity with the disbursement to be determined as part of the annual budget. This annual disbursement will be set up for every February. Another motion was made, seconded and all in favor that the February 2020 disbursement be used for Camp Onomia expenses.

New Business.

The Council reviewed the 2020 Budget and report for the January 26 Annual Meeting.

Ministry Team Updates

The <u>Communications and Technology Ministry Team</u> met and is reviewing website additions and changes. They have also discussed advertising on facebook for church events, soup and sandwich suppers, Easter breakfast, etc. A trial period can be purchased and we can see how that works. Service recording was also discussed. The City of Belle Plaine prefers the services on thumb drives and it is suggested that we have an external hard drive for storage of services. Chris Zellmann will purchase 3 thumb drives for rotation of services to the city and an external hard drive for storage. Cost could be less than \$100.00

<u>Building and Grounds Ministry Team</u> Tim Moonen is stepping down as chairman and would also like to step down from managing and being the point person for the rental properties. He has been the acting "landlord" for about 10 years. Thank you Tim for all your hard work!

<u>Constitution Update Team</u> Sandy Schultz reports that she is down to the last 3 years of the Constitution update. Thank you so much to Sandy for all your hard work on our Constitution.

Discussion was held on a Fall Festival for 2020 or a Spring Festival, and the possibility of having 2 committees, one for a fall event and one for a spring event and rotating those events each year. This will be mentioned at the annual meeting and follow up to see if there are individuals interested in serving on these committees.

Motion was made, seconded and carried to adjourn the meeting at 7:45 p.m. followed by a prayer.
