From Pastor Mark

I grew up on the old hymns and have come to appreciate them over the years in a deep place in my heart. Those old hymn writers were theologians and poets who set down some beautiful and powerful lyrics that were then set to music so that all worshipers could be united together in voicing praise and adoration to God. What a deep gift those old hymns are. If you just read the words, many of them are beautifully structured meditations and stand on their own as fine devotional reading.

Of course, some of these old hymns have an interesting back story that adds layer and dimension to their meaning. And perhaps the most famous of these is "Amazing Grace" which is, quite possibly, the most popularly known hymn of all time.

John Newton was born in London in 1725 and his mother died two weeks before he turned seven. His father, a stern sea captain, took him to sea when he was eleven and after many voyages and a wild youth he was impressed into the British navy. He tried to desert and received a lashing and was reduced to the rank of a common seaman. In 1745 he was serving on a slave ship and did not get along with the crew so they left him with a slave trader in West Africa where, along with the slaves, he was treated terribly. Newton's father asked a sea captain to look for his son and, in 1748, he was found a rescued.

On the way home the ship encountered a severe storm off the coast of Ireland. He awoke in the middle of the night as the ship was filling with water and cried out to God. All at once, the cargo shifted and plugged the place where the water was coming in and the ship made it to safety. This was a moment of awakening for Newton. He began to read the Bible and "The Imitation of Christ," by Thomas a Kempis. Even so, he continued to work in the slave trade, selling his fellow human beings, making three different voyages as the captain of two vessels. In 1754 he suffered a stroke and retired but continued to invest in the business.

But God was working on him. He felt a calling to study for the ministry, encouraged and influenced by John and Charles Wesley and George Whitefield. In 1764, at the age of 39, he became an ordained minister of the Anglican church in the little village of Olney, near Cambridge. When enough hymns could not be found, Newton began to write some of his own, assisted by his friend William Cowper. In 1779, they produced the famous "Olney Hymns" hymnal which contained "Amazing Grace."

It was not until 1788, thirty four years after he left the slave trade, that he renounced it with a pamphlet entitled, "Thoughts upon the Slave Trade," describing the horrendous conditions of the slaves on the slave ships. Newton apologized for making a statement so many years later by writing, "It will always be a subject of humiliating reflection to me that I was once an active instrument in a business at which my heart now shudders."

Newton's pamphlet was popular and reprinted many times and sent to every member of the British Parliament. He became an ally of abolitionist William Wilberforce in Parliament. The Parliament adopted "The Slave Trade Act" in 1807, abolishing slavery, and John Newton lived to see it's passage, dying in December of that year.

Until his death at the age of 82, John Newton never ceased to marvel at the grace of God that had transformed him so completely. Shortly before his death he is quoted as proclaiming with a loud voice during one of his messages, "My memory is nearly gone, but I remember two things: That I am a great sinner and that Christ is a great Savior!"

With this as background, the words of this familiar old hymn take on a fresh and powerful meaning. And over the years, they have gone on to touch and transform many hearts. The version we sing today edits out some of the original verses of Newton's hymn. Here's the full version with all the verses:

Amazing Grace! How sweet the sound - that saved a wretch like me!

I once was lost, but now am found; was blind, but now I see.

In evil long I took delight, un-awed by shame or fear;

'Til a new object met my sight and stopped my wild career.

I saw One hanging on a tree, in agonies of blood -

Who fixed His languid eves on me - as near His cross I stood.

Sure, never 'til my latest breath - can I forget that look;

It seemed to charge me with his death - though not a word He spoke.

My conscience owned and felt the guilt - and plunged me in despair

I saw my sins His blood had shed, and helped to nail Him there.

Alas, I knew not what I did - but all my tears were vain; Where could my trembling soul be hid - For I, the Lord, had slain. A second look he gave which said, "I freely all forgive! This blood is for thy ransom paid, I die that thou mayest live." Twas grace that taught my heart to fear - and grace my fears relieved; How precious did that grace appear, the hour I first believed. Through many dangers, toils and snares - I have already come. 'Tis grace has brought me safe thus far - and grace will lead me home. *The Lord has promised good to me - His word my hope secures;* He will my shield and portion be - as long as life endures. Yes, when this flesh and heart shall fail - and mortal life shall cease; I shall possess within the veil - a life of joy and peace. *The earth shall soon dissolve like snow - the sun forbear to shine;* But God who called me here below - shall be forever mine. When we've been there ten thousand years - bright shining as the sun; We've no less days to sing God's praise - then when we've first begun!"

Opening Devotions:

Pastor Mark and Council Members opened the meeting with a prayer.

Approval of Minutes:

Members of Council reviewed the minutes from April 14, 2022 Council Meeting. Motion was made, seconded and carried to approve the meeting minutes from April. A motion was made, seconded and carried to approve the agenda for May 19, 2022.

Pastor Mark's Report:

The Minneapolis Area Synod Assembly met in person for the first time in two years on Saturday, April 30, at Central Lutheran Church in downtown Minneapolis. I attended the Assembly along with our elected delegates from St. John, Jim and Diane Kerr and Angie Faucette. Participation in the Assembly provides a good opportunity to appreciate that we are part of a larger church. St. John is a local expression of the larger body of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, partnering with other congregations locally and around the world and, through this body, supporting agencies that foster social justice, higher education, mission work, immigration and refugee resettlement, disaster response, world hunger and a host of other concerns.

Connect and Confirmation classes have wrapped up for the current program year. It has been a good year and I am thankful for the great group of adult leaders that we have who have contributed so much of their time and interest and care in walking with our young people on their developing journey of faith formation.

I have met with Linda Schwichtenberg. Pre-covid she was responsible for helping to organize our variety of volunteer groups for worship, fellowship etc. We set up a timeline for rebooting our groups this Fall that will include refining our lists, meeting with leaders (or recruiting new ones), reviewing our duties and job descriptions, filling out volunteer rosters and repopulating a schedule. Some activities, like Holy Communion, will be different post covid and will take additional planning and volunteers to staff both our worship services. We will continue to move ahead with this process over the Summer months.

We continue to gradually emerge from the pandemic. I am seeing some faces at church that I haven't seen for a long time. That said, attendance continues to be a concern. Renewed volunteering in different ways this Fall will increase engagement. A strategic plan that engages the whole congregation about the vitality of it's future would also be an engaging stimulus. And, while our online worship option has been necessary and will continue to be for some people, I would like to see more people for in person worship. I would refer you to my April newsletter article in which I address this issue more fully.

Vacation Bible School is resuming after a two year hiatus with "Day Camp" provided by counselors from Camp Onomia. Pre-Covid we have done Day Camp for many years and it's good to see it return again. The Children's Ministry Team is helping to register and sponsor this event, along with promoting another opportunity for VBS, as well, which will be a multi-church, bi-lingual opportunity by our Synod's local Spanish Ministry, Cristo Obrero, taking place the first week of August at Belle Plaine's "Prairie Oaks Institute." St. John will serve as a back-up location in case of inclement weather.

Ongoing weekly and monthly parish duties will continue apace throughout the Summer and we also will be gearing up and preparing for a busy Fall.


