

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From Pastor Mark

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice.
Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near.
Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer
and supplication, together with thanksgiving,
let your requests be made known to God.
And the peace of God, that passes all understanding,
will keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."
(Philippians 4:4-7)

November brings with it the holiday of Thanksgiving. It is traditionally a time when families come together to share a meal and to be with each other. This year, however, is different. In order to care for each other during a pandemic, we are not supposed to get together. And, for that matter, we are enduring separation from loved ones in nursing homes and hospitals. All of the ordinary ways we are used to interacting are called into question. The familiar and comforting bonds of togetherness are strained and broken. It is a difficult time. We grow weary. And yet, as folks have been called to sacrifice for a greater cause in the past, we are called to endure and to do so today, out of love and care for one another.

Eve was surrounded by everything she needed in the Garden of Eden. The serpent came along and pointed out the one thing missing. She should not eat of the tree in the center of the garden. And pretty soon, that's all she wanted to do. She forgot about all of the good things around her and focused on the one thing she lacked. What she was missing became the center of her attention. And it brought her down.

Life can be like that. It's all too easy to forget about the positive and to focus on what is missing. And pretty soon, that becomes of primary importance and overwhelms everything else. Our whole world can be colored by what we see as lacking. And that will bring us down, too.

It's not easy to live through these times. We sorely miss the things that we have for so long taken for granted. And we will need to continue to miss them for awhile. And it does hurt. And we do acknowledge the pain of it.

And here it is that St. Paul speaks a word to us in his beautiful little letter to the Philippians. Paul was in prison when he wrote this letter, awaiting trial and possibly execution. He was cut off from loved ones. His future was anything but certain. And yet, in a larger sense, it was completely certain. For, as he says, "The Lord is near." In prison, he could write: "Rejoice in the Lord always! Again I will say it, "Rejoice!" Why? Because "The Lord is near." And because the Lord was near, his future was certain. No matter what might happen to him, he leaned back and rested in the promise that nothing could separate him from the love that God had for him in Christ. He knew that neither death nor life could break that bond. And so he knew that he was held, even in such a difficult time, in large hands of life and hope and grace.

Paul could have worried excessively. And, let's face it, there are times when that is pretty easy to do! But Paul goes on to say, "Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication, let your requests be made known to God." Worry and anxiety weren't going to change Paul's circumstances. So he gave it over to God. By prayer, he placed himself and his situation into the Lord's hands.

I love the little "Serenity Prayer." There's a lot of wisdom in it. "God grant me the serenity to accept the things that I cannot change..." That includes a lot. I cannot change other people. There are circumstances beyond my control. These things I need to give over to God. The next line says, "The courage to change the things I can..." Yes, there are some things I can change. I can change some things about myself. I can make decisions about how I want to think and act and seek to follow them through. And the last line is the tricky one, "And the wisdom to know the difference..." Where is the fence line between what I can change and what I can't? We can add a lot of fret and worry onto our plates that we can't really do anything about. So it's good to be aware of that and to decide what it mine, what isn't, and what to hand over to God.

But let's also not forget the little phrase that Paul tucks in there when he tells us not to worry but to let our requests be made known to God - "together with thanksgiving." That is very important. Our prayers can sometimes become such a laundry list of what we want God to do, "Take care of this, watch over that, etc." that we forget what we have to be thankful for.

Giving thanks is a good antidote for worry. Remembering what we have to be grateful for is a good counterbalance to focusing on what we lack. A heart full of thanks and praise is a strong heart. And so, let us not forget to remember to give thanks in our prayers, as well. And I'd suggest not simply a general, "thanks for all my blessings" kind of thing but a thoughtful remembering and reflecting on what it is we have to be thankful for.

I love the words of the old hymn that says, "Count your blessings, count them one by one. Then, you'll see what the Lord has done." Count them one by one. Take ten minutes and sit down and write out what you have to be thankful for. Let your mind go. Brainstorm it. There are no wrong answers. Just get it out there. And then, turn your list into a prayer of gratitude. Allow yourself to sink down in warmth for all that you have to be grateful for. Take your time with it. There is no rush. Time, itself, is a gift.

Yes, we live in a stressful time. In many ways. But the Lord is near. God is good, always. God has not abandoned us or forsaken us. God is holding us in seen and unseen ways in arms of loving grace. And so let us make our requests known to God. And let us give thanks to God. And let it not be just related around a holiday once a year in November but a daily practice that we engage in. It can, and it will, change our heart and mind and life.

THE CHANGING OF THE SEASONS

October brought us our first snowstorm since the thaw last spring. Every year, we know it's coming, but when it arrives, we still seem to be caught a little bit by surprise. Comments about driving skills and conditions, snow shovels, and winter gear suddenly pop into our conversations, and checking the forecast to see just how heavy of a coat we will need becomes a daily routine.

There is always some worry in this transitional time, but there is excitement, too. Sleds and skis come out of storage along with the shovels and mittens. Impromptu snowball fights arise, and snow angels and people are created as the world is covered in a blanket of flakes and frost.

The days are shorter, but the stars shine sooner. In a little while, the streets will be decorated with extra lights to illuminate the early evenings. Familiar carols and Christmas tunes will start playing on the radio, and it will be almost impossible not to sing along.

At church, the seasons change, too. We have come through Epiphany, Lent, and Easter to Pentecost and Ordinary Time. In November, we will celebrate All Saints Day and Christ the King Sunday before starting all over again with Advent on November 29.

The Gospel Reading for that first week of Advent talks about watching the seasons. Jesus speaks of signs and portends, which sound ominous, but he also reminds us also that we don't know God's timing. Jesus tells the disciples to keep awake, be alert, and be ready. It's a season of watching and waiting. It's a season of anticipation.

Winter is a good season for Advent. As snowstorms keep us indoors or prevent travel, we are reminded that we are not always in control. As harvests are processed and stored, we are reminded of our dependence upon God's creation for our lives. As we experience the quieting of the world—as birds travel away and animals hibernate—we are reminded of the ebb and flow of the year. As we walk across ice and snow, we are reminded of the seeds underneath it that wait to sprout again in the spring, and we anticipate the new life that will return.

Winter is a good season for Advent. It's a good season for us to reflect on God's presence now and look ahead to the hope of what is to come.

As you journey through this month, take time to notice the changing of the seasons. Reflect on where you find God's presence in the world around you, and ask where God might be working in and through you as well.

Opening Devotions: Pastor Mark shared opening devotions

Approval of Minutes: Members of Council reviewed the minutes from the September 24, 2020 Council Meeting with the following addition: The pastors share of the SIlver Plus insurance is up to 25% from 20%. Motion was made, seconded and carried to approve the meeting minutes.

Pastor Mark's Report:

Worship Services: Drive In Worship continues through October on the front steps of the church on Saturday evenings at 6:00 p.m. We will be in discussion with the Worship and Music Team about transitioning indoors after that and how we will set up to meet the current protocols. Sunday morning in-building worship continues at 9:00 a.m. with twenty to thirty people in attendance. Services are recorded Sunday mornings and posted online on our Facebook page and website on Monday afternoons.

Bible Sunday was held on October fourth with a blessing of the Bibles during the service and a pick up of the Bible story books following the service. Connect students received a Lutheran Study Bible, which will continue to be the Bible we distribute going forward.

Ninth Grade Confirmands and families met on September 25 to make sashes, receive faith statements and Bible verse sheets, get measured for a gown, have their picture taken, and draw for a family pew and table for Confirmation Sunday. I met with each Confirmand individually the following two Sundays to review their faith statements and Bible verses for publication. Confirmation weekend features Confirmands and families gathering on Saturday, October 24, at 10:00 a.m. for professional picture taking (we are making a group collage this year), rehearsal, a speaker, and recognition and gifts for Confirmands and Small Group Leaders. Sunday, October 25, we are hosting a special Confirmation service at 1:00 p.m. This allows proper clean up time after our morning service and gives Confirmand families more space under our current limitations.

I invited our area pastors to St. John recently for our first ecumenical get together since the pandemic. We had a nice opportunity to catch up and hear about how we are all doing ministry these days. We will be taking a pass this year on our Ecumenical Community Thanksgiving service. However, we will all take special offerings in our parishes to continue to support our commonly held Good Samaritan Fund. We plan to continue to meet monthly. The Southwest Metro Conference has also been meeting virtually by Zoom monthly. Some churches have just opened their doors recently. Others have not yet and don't plan to for the foreseeable future. Everyone is approaching things a little differently.

We have had a number of baptisms in the past month, hosting them in small family gatherings. I have also coordinated with the Activities Directors at the Lutheran Home and Kingsway to host a virtual worship service, with Holy Communion, for residents there. With a special offering for our missionary. We plan to continue hosting our worship services on the first Tuesday of each month.

We have had some need to observe our Covid protocols in the office and we will continue to abide by the best practices as directed by the Minnesota Department of Health guidelines. We continue to hold safety for all as a first priority.

I have been in touch with the Joshua Group and the James Company representatives that we plan to interview when we get back to having the opportunity to adequately engage in Strategic Planning in our congregation. I will provide an estimate for budgeting purposes for next year.

Pastor Sarah's Report:

Sunday School—The Children's Ministry Team rescheduled the 1st Graders' Bible Sunday to October 4. Students were able to pick up their Bibles along with their lesson packets for the month of October. An online option was also available to accompany the lesson video.

Connect—Connect began on September 23. Since Bible Sunday needed to be postponed, students received their Bibles on Wednesday evening during class. The teachers joined in a special Bible Blessing for them as well.

Confirmation—Confirmation Lesson Videos and Worksheets have been uploaded to a Google Drive File and a link emailed to the primary email address for each student (provided on the Confirmation Registration Form). Students, Parents, and Small Group Leaders have been working together to ensure that lessons are completed and students still are able to see their classmates each week. 9th Grade Confirmation Students have been meeting with the pastors to discuss and complete preparations for Confirmation Sunday on October 25. The Confirmation Service itself is being held separately so that congregational members can still attend regular worship services and families can bring more guests while maintaining proper distancing.

Worship—Drive-in Worship will be coming to an end as the seasons change.

Ongoing Items—Preparation continues for sermons and worship leadership, newsletter articles, and other communication pieces. Prep work, policies, and communications for Fall Programming and building use. Meetings with ministry teams and staff. Other duties as needed.

Staff Report: Custodial Updates:

No new reports - Curt will call the window company for a status. We have out 50% down.

Treasurer:

Rae presented the September financial reports. She shared that the general fund is 8% under last year, the building fund is 30% under last year. Our loan balance is under \$230,000. Curt will look into getting bids for some TV's and DVD players for the sunday school rooms. Rae asked for volunteers to look at the draft budget with her. Thanks to Matt Stier, Bob Fairbanks, Chris Stier and Wendy Theis. Rae also shared the our PPE loan is paid off and that amount (\$57,000) has been put into the budget.

The executive committee will be meeting on Sunday, November 15th at 10:00am with a planning meeting at 10:30.


